It is difficult finding books that cover single regiments with solid information that only pertains to the unit itself sometimes. Author Craig Dunn has put together a very comprehensive book that covers the birth of the 19th Indiana to final muster in 1865. Dunn covers early exhaustive marches, campaigns, camp life, politics and explains the many personalities within the 19th.
